Directions for Stage Two

The directions below are for applicants from the South Caucasus to the ARISC Publication Support Grant. Please read these directions first:

- Read the full call for applications for the ARISC Publication Support Grant at <https://arisc.org/arisc-publication-support-grant-2024-25/>
- Look through the list of US scholars who have submitted their application at Stage One, on the following page. When you have found a scholar/scholars you may be interested in working with, email them directly using the email address they have provided.
- Share a draft of your proposed paper to be submitted for this grant application.
- The US scholar will read this paper and let you know directly if they agree to work with you on the piece, should it be awarded.
- You will need to save the US scholar's email response to you to submit with your application.
- The US scholar will not make any updates to your paper at this stage.
- If the US scholar declines, then return to the list and try another person on the list.
- South Caucasus applicants are not limited to the individuals on this list and are welcome to reach out to US scholars themselves. These US scholars should then complete the Stage One application, and if they meet eligibility requirements, they will be added to the list of scholars on the following page.
- If you are unable to find anyone, please contact ARISC at info@arisc.org with the subject, "assistance needed for finding U.S. scholar for Publication Support Grant application." While ARISC can provide some networking support, we cannot guarantee a match.
- If you reach out to more than one US scholar and both agree to be listed on your project, you are responsible for alerting those you don't select that you will not be submitting an application with them.
- You may need to work together with the US Scholar to create the application piece, "Time frame for project completion."
- Applications are due January 31, 2025, and are manually processed. Co-applicants should both expect to receive an email from ARISC indicating receipt approximately 2-3 days after submission. If you do not receive a response, check your spam filter, then contact info@arisc.org.
